Supplemental workshops. There are eight supplemental workshops planned in conjunction with Math 248 every quarter, Math 306 in the Fall and Winter, Math 412 in the Fall, and Math 481 in the Fall and Winter. These are required courses for all math majors.

Graders. Upper division math courses for majors would have about three hours per week of grading time.

Tutoring. Drop in tutoring for upper division courses would be available about ten hours per week.

Summer research. The summer research program will have 9 Cal Poly math majors working with faculty advisers during the summer of 2006.

Research funds for senior projects. Students can get some financial help on their senior projects in order to purchase a book or software.

Travel to professional meetings. This is for student and faculty travel to MathFest, other MAA meetings, NCTM meetings.

Assigned time for probationary faculty. This enables the department to give two young faculty members a one-course reduction during the spring.

Access to classes. This would help provide the number of sections of upper division courses necessary for timely degree progress.
