WSCUC Decision on Accreditation Expected During Summer

In late April, Cal Poly hosted a five-member visiting team from its institutional accrediting body, WASC Senior College and University Commission (WSCUC). The team met with over 20 groups of stakeholders from across campus during this visit. Most of these meetings were on various elements of diversity, equity, inclusion and student success, the themes of the institutional self-study submitted in February. The visit concluded with an exit meeting at which the team presented its initial commendations and recommendations. In particular, the team praised Cal Poly for close collaboration between divisions, for the decision to situate the institutional self-study in questions of DEI and student success, for students' passion and dedication, for the institution's commitment to meaningful student-centered programs and for the quality of staff and faculty support of students. The team also thanked the campus for its commitment to transparency and honest dialogue. After the visiting team members prepare their final report, WSCUC will make its accreditation decision in late June. The decision will be shared with the campus community at that time.

Retirements

Nutrition Professor **Peggy Papathakis** is retiring after 16 years at Cal Poly. She joined the Food Science and Nutrition Department in 2006 determined to engage in nutrition research in low-income countries and provide global nutrition experiences for nutrition students. In the last decade, more than 70 students have worked on her numerous research studies focused on improving the nutritional status of women and children in Malawi and Sierra Leone, Africa. In 2018 she received a Fulbright Scholar award to spend 10 months in Malawi, conducting research on hospital malnutrition and helping to build nutrition curriculum for clinical dietitians at the University of Malawi, College of Medicine. This was Papathakis' second Fulbright Scholarship; she received one as a doctoral student in 2001 to conduct research in South Africa on the dual impact of breastfeeding and HIV on a woman's nutritional status. Papathakis was instrumental in setting up a new scholarship for nutrition graduate students, the Beatrice Lunday Memorial Scholarship. She received several awards during her tenure, including the Cal Poly Distinguished Scholarship Award in 2016, CAFES New Faculty Award in 2010 and CAFES Sustained Excellence in Scholarship Award in 2016. Prior to coming to Cal Poly, Papathakis worked as a pediatric dietitian for more than 20 years.
