Cal Poly Fall 2022 Commencement Set for Dec. 10

Cal Poly will honor more than 900 eligible graduates in the 39th annual fall commencement on Saturday, Dec. 10. The celebration will commemorate graduates from each college in one ceremony. Festivities will start at 10 a.m. at the Alex G. Spanos Stadium on campus. The university expects around 9,000 guests.

"Commencement, spring or fall, remains one of the best days of the school year for the campus community and the entire Mustang family," President Armstrong said. "These members of the Class of 2022 are ready to take on new challenges as they begin careers or continue their educational journeys. This is the walk they've prepared their entire lives to make." The ceremony will include performances by the Cal Poly Chamber Choir and feature large LED screens with closed captioning for graduates and guests to view. Campus Community Supports Students, Local Residents

Recent gift drives and donation efforts raised thousands of dollars, more than 150 pounds of food and personal items, and about 180 gifts to support students and community members. At the Dec. 1 holiday reception, employees supported Cal Poly's Basic Needs programs by donating 154 pounds of nonperishable food and personal hygiene items, as well as \$70 worth of grocery gift cards. Additional online donations were made to support Cal Poly Cares, the Food Pantry, and Health and Counseling Services, while others supported the Food Pantry by purchasing from its Amazon Wishlist (https://www.amazon.com/hz/wishlist/ls/343W2G6S15SSP?ref_=wl_s_hare). On Giving Tuesday, Campus Dining opened a donation shop on the Grubhub app. Students and staff donated \$3,500 to the Mustang Meal Share program. In addition, Cal Poly's Center for Service in Action hosted its annual Mustang Holiday Gift Drive to fulfill gift requests from local children and teens. This year 163 gifts and \$725 were donated. The funds will be used to fulfill approximately 23 more gift requests, bringing total gifts fulfilled to 186.

Police to Hold Active Shooter Training at Kennedy Library on Dec. 13 and 17

The Cal Poly Police Department will work with the San Luis Obispo Police and Fire departments on training for an active shooter scenario in drills to be held Tuesday, Dec. 13, and Saturday, Dec. 17, at Kennedy Library on campus. Campus community members may see law enforcement and emergency personnel around the building between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. both days. CPPD takes part in active shooter training annually with other local agencies. These trainings are held at locations on and off campus from year to year, providing an opportunity for Cal Poly officers and those from nearby departments to prepare for the possibility of an emergency and familiarize themselves with buildings and terrain within one another's jurisdictions. Retirements

Bruno Giberti, associate vice provost for Academic Programs and Planning and accreditation liaison officer, has announced his retirement. Giberti's last day will be Dec. 31. Interim leadership will be shared in the coming weeks. Giberti came to Cal Poly's Architecture Department in 1994 as an architectural historian specializing in topics relating to modernity and the United States. Prior to assuming the post of associate vice provost in 2017, he served as faculty director of Cal Poly's self-study for the Western Association of Schools and Colleges, director of the Center for Teaching, Learning and Technology, associate head of the Architecture Department and faculty associate for Academic Policies, Assessment and Accreditation and chair of the Academic Senate. Giberti is a proud Cal Poly alumnus, and after graduating with a B.S. in architecture, he earned his M.A. and doctorate in architecture from UC Berkeley. A retirement reception, open to the campus community, will be held from 3-5 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 19, in the Rossi Grand Lobby of the Performing Arts Center.

Dr. Aaron Baker, medical director of Campus Health and Wellbeing, will retire at the end of the calendar year. Baker started his time at Cal Poly as a toddler in the Child Development Lab. He later returned and earned a degree in mechanical engineering in 1979 before attending medical school at UC San Francisco. He then completed his residency in emergency medicine at UCSF — Fresno. His career in Campus Health and Wellbeing began in 1984 as a corpsman before being hired as a per-diem physician in 2006. Baker has served as the medical director of CHW for the last seven years, during which time he successfully led the campus through the COVID-19 pandemic, Norovirus, Meningococcal B exposure and mpox, and has provided medical care to countless students. In retirement, he looks forward to many bike rides, flying and volunteering for the Youth Symphony.
